The Debt

Matthew 18:21-35²¹Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother who sins against me? Up to seven times?"²²Jesus answered, "I tell you, not just seven times, but seventy-seven times! ²³Because of this, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. ²⁴As he began the settlements, a debtor was brought to him owing ten thousand talents. ²⁵Since the man was unable to pay, the master ordered that he be sold to pay his debt, along with his wife and children and everything he owned. ²⁶Then the servant fell on his knees before him. 'Have patience with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' ²⁷His master had compassion on him, forgave his debt, and released him. ²⁸But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii. He grabbed him and began to choke him, saying, 'Pay back what you owe me.' ²⁹So his fellow servant fell down and begged him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you back.' ³⁰But he refused. Instead, he went and had him thrown into prison until he could pay his debt. ³¹When his fellow servants saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and recounted all of this to their master. ³²Then the master summoned him and declared, 'You wicked servant! I forgave all your debt because you begged me. ³³Should you not have had mercy on your fellow servant, just as I had on vou?' ³⁴In his anger, his master turned him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should repay all that he owed. ³⁵That is how My Heavenly Father will treat each of you, unless you forgive your brother from your heart." (NIV)

- I. Here are the details of this parable.
 - A. It was to answer a question that <u>Peter</u> had asked. V. 21
 - **B.** A *king* wanted to settle accounts with his servants. V. 23
 - C. The first servant owed him <u>750,000</u> pounds of gold. The current price of gold is 1,200 dollars per ounce. Therefore this servant owed him 14.4 <u>billion</u> dollars in current spot gold price! V. 24
 - D. The king ruled that everything the servant owned was to be sold and his entire family sold into slavery until the <u>debt</u> could be paid. V. 25
 - E. This servant *begged* for more time to pay off the debt. V. 26
 - F. The king had *compassion* on him and forgave the entire debt. V. 27
 - **G.** This same servant was owed <u>\$147.84</u> by another servant. He grabbed this other servant and began to choke him to get repayment. V. 28
 - H. The second servant begged for more time but instead was thrown in <u>prison</u> until he could pay off the debt. V. 29-30.
 - I. The master was told about the lack of *compassion* of the first servant. V. 31

- J. The master changed his mind and ordered that the *unforgiving* servant be jailed and tortured until the original 14.4 billion dollars could be repaid. V. 32-34
- K. Jesus concludes that this is how we are to be treated if we cannot forgive others from our <u>heart</u>. V. 35
- **II.** How can we apply this using the parable of the sower?
 - **A.** A hard heart is <u>unable</u> to extend real forgiveness.
 - B. A rocky heart will quote other <u>Scripture</u> such as an eye for an eye or tooth for a tooth.
 - **C.** A weedy heart will be able to forgive as long as it is in *<u>non-financial</u>* areas.
 - **D.** A healthy heart will take this as a <u>challenge</u> to be as close to God as they can get and live in a constant state of giving and receiving forgiveness.
