## **Sheol-Aid**

Proverbs 5:1-23 <sup>1</sup>My son, pay attention to my wisdom; incline your ear to my insight, <sup>2</sup>that you may maintain discretion and your lips may preserve knowledge. <sup>3</sup>Though the lips of the forbidden woman drip honey and her speech is smoother than oil, 4in the end she is bitter as wormwood, sharp as a double-edged sword. <sup>5</sup>Her feet go down to death; her steps lead straight to Sheol. <sup>6</sup>She does not consider the path of life; she does not know that her ways are unstable. <sup>7</sup>So now, my sons, listen to me, and do not turn aside from the words of my mouth. 8Keep your path far from her; do not go near the door of her house. 9lest you concede your vigor to others, and your years to one who is cruel; <sup>10</sup>lest strangers feast on your wealth, and your labors enrich the house of a foreigner. <sup>11</sup>At the end of your life you will groan when your flesh and your body are spent, <sup>12</sup> and you will say, "How I hated discipline, and my heart despised reproof! 13 did not listen to the voice of my teachers or incline my ear to my mentors. 14I am on the brink of utter ruin in the midst of the whole assembly." <sup>15</sup>Drink water from your own cistern, and running water from your own well. <sup>16</sup>Why should your springs flow in the streets, your streams of water in the public squares? <sup>17</sup>Let them be yours alone, never to be shared with strangers. <sup>18</sup>May your fountain be blessed, and may you rejoice in the wife of your youth: <sup>19</sup>A loving doe, a graceful fawn— may her breasts satisfy you always; may you be captivated by her love forever. <sup>20</sup>Why be captivated, my son, by an adulteress, or embrace the bosom of a stranger? <sup>21</sup>For a man's ways are before the eyes of the LORD, and the LORD examines all his paths. <sup>22</sup>The iniquities of a wicked man entrap him; the cords of his sin entangle him. <sup>23</sup>He dies for lack of discipline, led astray by his own great folly. (BSB)

- **I.** Here are the details of this passage.
  - **A.** Proverbs illustrates the need for repetition, restatements, and compare and contrast teaching when instructing our *children*. V.1-2
  - B. We are warned against getting tricked into sin by seductive words. V. 3-4
  - **C.** The alure of the *forbidden* leads to the grave. V. 5-7
  - **D.** The best approach is to <u>flee</u> from this type of temptation. V.8-11
  - E. We must *listen* to those who are trying to help us to be godly. V.12-14
  - **F.** Immorality is compared to drinking *polluted* water. V.15-17
  - **G.** Faithfulness to our <u>spouse</u> is compared to drinking pure, clean, refreshing water. V.18-19
  - H. We must *live* for the audience of one, our God Jehovah-Yahweh. V.20-23

- **II.** What can we learn from this passage?
  - **A.** We need to make an effort to be <u>creative</u> when instructing our children and others who are within our realm of influence.
  - **B.** Never make major life <u>choices</u> out of impulse, anger, or under the influence of flattering words.
  - **C.** Unconfessed and unrepented sin will <u>destroy</u> our faith. Without faith no one is saved.
  - **D.** Never <u>justify</u> sin by blaming others. We are responsible for our own choices.
  - **E.** We must stay within our <u>safety</u> zones that God has promised to bless us in.
  - **F.** Remember that God is <u>watching</u> and we will be held accountable for everything we do and say.
    - **Hebrews 4:13** Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight; everything is uncovered and exposed before the eyes of Him to whom we must give account. (BSB)
