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## Loneliness and Koinonia

For I received from the Lord what I also passed on to you: The Lord Jesus, on the night He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and said, "This is My body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of Me." In the same way, after supper He took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in My blood; do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes. Therefore, whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of sinning against the body and blood of the Lord. Each one must examine himself before he eats of the bread and drinks of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without recognizing the body eats and drinks judgment on himself. That is why many among you are weak and sick, and a number of you have fallen asleep. Now if we judged ourselves properly, we would not come under judgment. But when we are judged by the Lord, we are being disciplined so that we will not be condemned with the world. ~ I Corinthians 11:23-32 (BSB)

I have been studying what Scripture has to say about our spiritual fellowship that we are supposed to have with other Christians. The Greek word for this type of fellowship is "koinonia". I have been showing all of you how our Koinonia is the blood in the body of Christ, which is the church. I have taken us through studies that clearly show that the terms: body and blood of the Lord are used in three distinct ways. The first is the actual physical body and the literal blood of Jesus Christ. The second is the symbolic body and blood of the Lord in the elements in our communion ceremony. The third is more of a mystery. We are clearly told that the Church of Jesus Christ is the body of Christ. The blood is the mystery. I am convinced that the blood of the Church is the Holy Spirit interacting from believer to believer through relationship. Another word for this interaction is Koinonia!

A clear symptom, in the church, of lack of spiritual fellowship, i.e. Koinonia, is the rampant loneliness that has become prevalent in the US Church. A recent article in Christianity Today stated that the Christians who have confessed the feeling of loneliness is not that much different from those who do not profess to be Christians. <u>The Riddle of Church Loneliness | Christianity Today</u> Some of these findings did have a lot to do with the shutdown that was caused by Covid. However, the statistics taken after the pandemic still have not changed as much as they should have.

Because of all of this I have been continuing my series on Koinonia. Please make plans to join me on Sunday mornings as we examine what the Bible has to say about our spiritual fellowship.



#### From the Pew: Don't be a Pew Rider! The Ministry of the Pew.

The synonyms for pew are bench, seat, slip, and stall according to Thesaurus.com. The word originated in the 14th century and originally meant "a compartment in the auditorium of a church providing seats for several people". (Merriam-Webster.com)

Now move the definition several centuries forward. We view the pews as a place to sit. Pews are a place of comfort while we sit and hear about God's Word, about His message. Yes. That is true. But if you really stop to think about it, it becomes a little ironic, or maybe, a lot ironic! We sit in comfort while we hear a message designed to get us out of our comfort zone and serving God! We sit in comfort when we should be serving in humility!

I read an article recently about how we can break out of this comfort Pew mentality. It lead me to consider ways I can humbly serve our congregation in our church auditorium. I wanted to offer up some of those ideas for us to consider.

One such idea is that, even if I don't have a role in the Sunday service, I have a role in welcoming others to the service. Can I reach out my hand and tell someone, whether I know them or not, that it was good to see them in church? If someone comes to church that I don't know, can I walk up and ask their name and say hi? If someone seems reluctant to connect to others, can I take the chance to smile and say hi? And if there is one who seems troubled, can I offer to pray for them, right there and/or through the week?

The second greatest commandment Jesus gave us was to love others like we love ourselves. Pastor has been speaking a lot about koinonia, believers fellowship, community, and connection. I fully believe that this trait is vital to the life of the local body of Christ, the church. The test of our koinonia may very well be whether we can leave the comfort of our pews to step out in the humility of service to love one another as Christ decreed.

Let's see if we can get a little uncomfortable for Christ this month!
