Three Kings Day

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the One who has been born King of the Jews? We saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him." ~ Matthew 2:1-2 (BSB)

After they had heard the king, they went on their way, and the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stood over the place where the Child was. ¹⁰When they saw the star, they rejoiced with great delight. ¹¹On coming to the house, they saw the Child with His mother Mary, and they fell down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. ~ Matthew 2:9-11(BSB)

I always wondered what the twelve days of Christmas meant. It turns out that our Christian ancestors celebrated a day called Three Kings Day. This celebration took place exactly twelve days after Christmas. This celebration was in honor of the Maji who brought Jesus gifts after seeing the star in the east and setting out on a journey to find the new-born king. Three Kings Day falls on January 6th. Some of the other names of this holiday are: Little Christmas, Denha, Theophany, Día de Los Reyes, and the Baptism of Jesus. I do not believe there were only three kings traveling because it would be very dangerous to only have three people wandering around carrying gold and other valuable objects. However, this is Christian tradition that there were three.

One of the traditions of this day is that children leave out their shoes filled with treats for the wisemen's camels. They would fill these shoes with hay, corn, or even sugar cubes. These treats would be gone in the morning and in their place would be small gifts for the children. This would be similar to our stocking tradition. In Latin America the Maji are more prominent than Santa Claus. In the USA, before the 1960's, Christians would go wassailing on the twelfth night. This means that they would go caroling in their neighborhoods and would receive food and drink for their efforts. "Now bring us some figgy pudding...."

I personally like this tradition because it highlights that the wisemen didn't see Jesus lying in a manger. They arrived at a house and Jesus is described as being a child of 2-3 years old not as a baby. Another thing that I like about this tradition is that it makes the holidays last a little longer. December 26th seems so anticlimactic to me. Some Christians do add this day to their celebration and they call it Boxing Day. This is the day in which they box up their Christmas leftovers and visit friends. However, the celebration of Three Kings Day would make the holidays last until the first week in January. You could also get great bargains in the after Christmas sales. Anyway, I thought that this was fascinating and that it would make a good newsletter article. Either way, happy Three Kings Day to everyone!
