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Toxic Compassion

My son, if you have put up security for your neighbor, if you have struck hands in pledge with a stranger, 2if you have been trapped by the words of your lips, ensnared by the words of your mouth, 3then do this, my son, to free yourself, for you have fallen into your neighbor's hands: Go, humble yourself, and press your plea with your neighbor. 4Allow no sleep to your eyes or slumber to your eyelids. 5Free yourself, like a gazelle from the hand of the hunter, like a bird from the snare of the fowler. ~ Proverbs 6:1-5 (BSB)

I am currently preaching through a series on the book of Proverbs. In my sermon a few weeks ago I mentioned a term called Toxic Compassion. This is when our good intentions of helping others out with their daily load actually ends up hurting them or even us in the process. In Proverbs 6 the writer warns against taking on the responsibility of paying off another person's debt. This passage pleads with the reader to get out of such obligations and even not to ever get into this commitment.

I have a book in my library that deals with this very subject. The title of the book is *When Helping Hurts*. It is written by Steve Corbett and Brian Fikkert. Here are a couple of wise quotes from the book:

"Until we embrace our mutual brokenness, our work with low-income people is likely to do more harm than good. I sometimes unintentionally reduce poor people to objects that I use to fulfill my own need to accomplish something. I am not okay, and you are not okay. But Jesus can fix us both."

"If we treat only the symptoms or if we misdiagnose the underlying problem, we will not improve their situation, and we might actually make their lives worse."

I will be continuing our series in Proverbs during our Sunday morning service. This topic of helping the poor will be revisited in future sermons. May we learn to have wisdom in helping the poor. It is not helpful to be taking on the responsibilities that they need to be doing themselves. Please join me on Sunday mornings as we seek God's wisdom in this area.

(Emphasis added)

In considering the scripture something screamed out at me. It screamed: You make the choice, choose the right outfit!!! If I choose to wear rags, and not His finest clothing, people will see rags. I don't know about you, but rags don't impress me. Yet, clothed in compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, and love, I am dressed "to impress ". The impression I am leaving is that of a loving Christ. One that redeemed me and wants to do the same for them.

I am certain that Christ can use a few well dressed followers this month! How about you joining me in "dressing to impress"? Let's pray that the Holy Spirit might lead us to one special person who would also like a new set of clothing?

A Voice in The Wind By Francine Rivers

This is the first book in the Mark of the Lion Series. It is based in first century Rome where the wealthy Roman citizens did as they pleased while Jews and other outsiders became slaves and gladiators. In this book we are introduced to Hadassah, a Jewish Christian slave girl, who clings to her faith in this godless society. We are also introduced to Marcus and Julia who are siblings in the household she serves.

A favorite past-time of many of the Romans is to go to the arena where gladiators are forced to fight to the death and Christians are fed to the lions. This is where we meet one of these gladiators, Atretes.

Rivers does a skillful job of weaving these lives together and transporting the reader into the past and seeing what life was like for the rich, the poor, the slaves, the free, and the early church.
