When we write a letter, our salutation is normally much simpler than the above quote! Sincerely yours, Love you, Hope to see you soon; things like that. But that was not how Paul ended his letter in 2 Corinthians.

His wish followed his final instructions to the church. Those instructions, if followed, were so that the church would resolve current problems and/or present themselves in a good light upon his arrival—whenever that happened. I would say we are in the same waiting stance as they. Only we are waiting for Jesus' return. Maybe we can look at those instructions, apply them, and be better ready for the day Christ comes back.

Read 2 Corinthians 13:11-14. Paul ended his letter by giving them five things to do; things that we can apply to ourselves.

Rejoice: after all Christ gives us new and everlasting life. Life which can not be taken from us.

Strive for full restoration of all within our community. The evil one wants to destroy connection and relationships. We do not have to allow him to do so. We can work hard and strive to restore and/or maintain them.

Encourage one another.

Be of one mind. Who's mind? Certainly not mine. I have too many hard, rocky, and shallow places. The truth is, so does everyone. It is one mind, the mind of Christ, that should be our goal and our measurement each day!

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From Our Missionaries

Jon has been encouraging us to bring others to get to know our blessed Savior, Jesus Christ. (He really wants to ring that bell.) In a letter from one of our missionaries they talk about ways to share with others. Their names are changed for protection purposes.

A missionary (Cindy) has been having some health issues and has started working out at a gym at 8am 4 times a week. Since Cindy is not a morning person, this is early for her. Meanwhile Cindy has gotten to know Julie who has been attending their church, although they do not know as of yet "where she stands in her walk with the Lord. Cindy was talking with Julie on Sunday about the gym and has invited Julie to come work out with her. In some ways this is a classic example of 'misery enjoys company', but the reality is that Cindy is being intentional about this relationship. She saw a way to connect and took advantage of the opportunity.

"Through this shared experience, *Cindy* is praying for ways to open up discussions with *Julie*. These will be simple conversations at first, 'I hate working out', for instance. Then, we trust they will move into deeper, significant conversations until eventually, they will lead into spiritual conversations. It is a very simple process to follow. Be purposeful and intentional about using everyday experiences to help formulate the conversations then just trust the Holy Spirit to lead the conversation in the way it should qo.

"Who are you working out with? Who are you playing golf with? Who are you going shopping with? Who are you . . ."

We often think of missionaries (or pastors for that matter) as being these super spiritual Christians and that we can never do that. But we can. We need to be intentional in our relationships. Pray for those relationships and listen to the Holy Spirit for when it is time to move conversations to spiritual ones. This is not going up to strangers and preaching at them. It is developing relationships so that they will be open to hearing about Jesus. Not every conversation will end up being a spiritual one, but just be open to it. Likewise, not every spiritual conversation will turn into that person accepting Christ as their Savior. Just keep planting those seeds.

I am reminded of a song called *Fifteen* by Greg Long that talks about this. Here is the chorus and the bridge.

"If it takes fifteen times
To hear about Jesus
For someone to believe
Wherever I stand in line
I've got to make a difference
In case it comes down to me
'Cause I may be the third
I may be the seventh
There may be years in between
But what if I'm fifteen
What if I'm fifteen, oh, yeah

God, I don't want to miss the chances When you open up the door What may seem so insignificant You see so much more "

Let's try to be intentional in our relationships. Let's all be "missionaries" in our communities. Even if you are not "fifteen", you are bringing them one step closer to being a true Christ follower.
